





## Introduction

he South African Human Rights Commission develops public educational materials targeting a variety of audiences. The materials are intended to raise awareness about human rights so that members of the public can learn about human rights, learn to recognise violations of human rights, and to be able to access support for protection of their rights, including to institutions such as the Commission.

The Commission launched a Child Friendly Human Rights Commission Campaign (the Campaign), in May 2017, to improve the protection of children's constitutional rights. The need for a campaign sought to address the Commissions concerns for the rights of children in South Africa and found form in recommendations by the Committee on the Rights of Children for the promotion of the rights of children. Broadly, the Campaign aims to re-emphasise the Commission's commitment to child rights and to make the Commission more accessible to children. Major actions in advancing these objectives were to create child friendly spaces within the Commission's nine provincial offices, and to develop special procedures for complaints from children.

Integral to the Campaign is the recognition that adults who care for and engage children must know and understand the rights of children. And that their actions should always be informed by children's rights and by the child's best interests. This Colouring Book is intended to be used with children to stimulate awareness of children's human rights. It further aims to focus children's attention on their rights as enshrined in the Constitution, the Bill of Rights, and to draw attention to Section 28, in an engaging, informative and fun manner.

This Colouring Book is intended to increase awareness of children's human rights for both children and the adults who care for and engage them, in order to provide information that facilitates peoples' ability to assert their rights. In this way the Commission aims to simplify access to the SAHRC for children, and in so doing to improve the plight of children in South Africa.

The Campaign includes the Child Friendly Complaints Handling Procedure, a simple version of the procedures in poster format and a fact sheet on children's rights and the SAHRC. It is recommended that all of these materials are engaged with in the school community and that educators in particular integrate this information in their life orientation teaching.

The Commission's Child Friendly Complaints Handling Procedure, is a guideline for Commission staff who handle human rights complaints lodged by children and comes into effect from the minute any child complainant reports a complaint to any of the Commission's provincial offices, up to the conclusion of such complaints.

In terms of this procedure, communication with the child will be kept simple and all reasonable measures will be taken to communicate with the child in the child's home language. All communication with the child will be kept confidential and not disclosed, unless the law requires.

All material related to the Child Friendly Campaign, including the Guidelines on the Child Friendly Complaints Handling Procedure, a fact sheet with more details on accompanies this colouring book, together with a poster simplifying the process, will be made available on the SAHRC website. 

# THE HIGHEST LAW IN SOUTH AFRICA THE CONSTITUTION

The Constitution protects everyone's rights, including children. Everyone must respect the Constitution.



Act 108 of 1996

## The Bill of Rights

- I have a right to be respected as a human being and I must respect others;
- I have a right to be treated fairly like everyone else and I must treat others the way I want to be treated:
- I have a right to life;
- I have a right to attend any church or follow any religious belief of my choice;
- I have a right to speak or express myself as long as what I say does not hurt others:
- I have a right to a clean and safe environment:

The Bill of Rights is the foundation of our democracy. The Bill of Rights protects the right to human dignity, equality and freedom for everyone, including children.

- I have a right to have clean drinkable water:
- I have a right to be protected from abuse and harm and I should not harm others:
- I have a right to be proud of my culture and I should respect the culture and beliefs of others;
- I have a right to food;
- I have a right to receive education;
- I have a right to belong to my country and to call it my home.

## Section 28 of the Constitution

Children are protected by all the rights in the Constitution, and also to all the rights in Section 28.





## Every child has the right

- a. To a name and a nationality from birth:
- b. To family care or parental care, or to appropriate alternative care when removed the family environment;
- c. To basic nutrition, shelter, basic health care services and social services;
- d. To be protected from maltreatment, neglect, abuse or degradation;
- e. To be protected from exploitative labour practices;
- f. Not to be required or permitted to perform work or provide services that:
  - i. Are appropriate for a person of that child's age; or
  - ii. Place at risk the child's well-being, education, physical or mental health or spiritual, moral or social development;

- g. Not to be detained except as a measure of last resort, in which case in addition to the rights a child enjoys under sections 12 and 35, the child may be detained only for the shortest appropriate period of time, and has the right to be
  - Kept separately from detained persons over the age of 18 years;
     and
  - ii. Treated in a manner, and kept in conditions, that take into account of the child's age;
- h. To have a legal practitioner assigned to the child by the state, and at state expense, in civil proceedings affecting the child, if substantial injustice would otherwise result; and
- Not to be used in armed conflict, and to be protected in times of armed conflict.


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












## 4. Help with Human Rights

## The South African Human Rights Commission

The South African Human Rights Commission is an organisation that is here to serve all people including children. The Commission's job is to promote human rights by teaching people about their rights and making sure that everyone respects each other. If you feel that your rights have not been respected, you can approach any of the South African Human Rights Commission's provincial offices for help.

Where else can children get help with their rights?

Children, parents and care givers can also visit other organisations that will help them, such as:

- Centre for Child Law at the University of Pretoria which promotes the best interest of children in the community. (012 420 4502)
- Save the Children as it promotes the rights of children
- ChildLine South Africa which is a 24-hour contact center that assists children and their families who have been victims of violence and provides social services and advice over the phone.

- **UNICEF** which is an international organisation with offices in Pretoria that promotes the rights and wellbeing of all children.
- The Department of Social Development as it provides social services to children and their families. (012 312 7980)
- Office of the Family Advocate which provides court officials to assist children during adoption and divorce proceedings. (012 315 1111)
- Thuthuzela Care Centers are part of the National Prosecuting Authority that assists children when children have to give evidence in court during cases of sexual abuse.

## The Equality Court

The Commission will assist you with your complaint and can also assist you by taking your complaint to the Equality Court. The Equality Court is free.

#### Children's Court

The Children's Court is a special court which deals with issues affecting children. Every Magistrates Court in South Africa is a Children's Court. The Children's Court also takes care of children who are in need of care and protection and makes decisions about children who are abandoned, neglected or abused, but it does not deal with criminal matters. Any person may approach the Children's Court to report any matter of child abuse.

## Other laws to protect children

South Africa has accepted and follows the following international treaties on children:

- The Universal Declaration of Human Rights of 1948
- The International Convention on the Elimination of all forms of Racial Discrimination of 1969
- The United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child of 1989 and
- The African Charter on the Rights and Welfare of the Child of 1989

In addition, the country has made these international laws into national laws, to assist children and promote the best interests of the child principle:

- Children's Act 38 of 2005
- Child Justice Act 75 of 2008
- Maintenance Act 99 of 1998
- South African Schools Act 84 of 1996
